I'm always excited to share the "good news" through this newsletter with our partners.



The increase in the size of our Family Shelter has resulted in an amazing increase in people needing shelter. In the past three years the number of children that called the Family Shelter “home” more than doubled, and sometimes it tripled.


This created a new challenge: how do we keep more than 30 kids busy when they’re on break from school? We couldn’t just do nothing. The sanity of the children, the adult guests, and the staff was in danger. The answer... a Christmas Vacation Bible School. We were going to keep them busy with Jesus!

Myra and Rene, the Family Shelter Director, started planning a week full of activities right away. With the help of Kristen, the Kitchen Coordinator, Azucena, Graphics Coordinator, and several volunteers we were able to have a successful program.

The theme was “God’s Gifts” and each day we unveiled a different gift. They learned about the birth of Jesus, about forgiveness, love, joy, and peace - about the real meaning of Christmas. Some had heard none of it before! They had time for singing, time for crafts, and time for snacks. They even put on a play about Jesus in the manger. They got to dress up as angels, or sheep, or Mary, Joseph, the three wisemen, or the shepherd.

They looked very cute!

The closing event was the live performance of the play in front of all the parents and all the other residents. They did an awesome job and we all enjoyed the play very much. We’re very proud and pleased of how it all turned out. So pleased, in fact, that we’ve decided to keep on having Vacation Bible Schools. What better way to keep kids busy than with Jesus? ♥

"I feel a hundred percent better. There's always going to be bad days but the worst day clean is better than the best day high."

Participating in Her Own Life!

Mijken started using marijuana when she was only 13 years old. Her addiction, and depression lead her to attempt suicide on two separate occasions. She came to Crossroads Mission and participated in the drug and alcohol recovery program twice. This is her story in her own words.

I wanted to be “cool” so I started using marijuana and before I knew it I was using marijuana on a daily basis. I am 44 years old now so that’s a 30 year drug addiction.

After using marijuana primarily, along with other drugs, occasionally methamphetamine, I had reached an age where I realized that I was an adult and that my life was passing me by. I felt like I was observing someone else’s life from behind a wall - the wall that I had built myself with drugs. I was not fully participating in life. In my life. As I was approaching middle age I realized that my life was half over and I had accomplished little, or nothing, of my dreams when I was a child. That led to depression. You can only get so depressed until

sometimes you try to end your life. Which I did on two occasions. The second attempt was with carbon monoxide poisoning in a car. There was an air leak somewhere in the car and thank God I wasn’t successful.

Drug court ordered me to go through the New Life Program. I came in unwilling and un-accepting of my drug addiction even though I was in probation and participating in drug court. I did not give myself fully to it. I went through the motions and graduated. The term they use is “fake it till you make it” and I didn’t make it. I was still depressed. The two suicide attempts I made were after I completed the drug court because I had such a sense of failure in not cleaning up my life and becoming clean and sober. I didn’t know what was missing.

The second time I came I asked to be let into the program. I think a key factor is that I accepted Jesus Christ into my life. You’re given the opportunity to do that every day here at Crossroads Mission. They remind you every day that Jesus Christ believes in you even if you don’t believe in yourself. I was at my rock bottom! If Jesus could help me then I was willing to

accept. And once I accepted that in my heart everything else just kind of fell into place. I involved myself in my recovery. I involved myself with the people here who worked tirelessly to help me every single day!

I’m very proud of myself! (Today) the sun is brighter, the birds are louder, I have hope! I have a better relationship with my family members. They trust me. They believe in me. They actually ask me for advice. I’m a part of their life. I’m participating in my life for a change!

With the depression I would isolate myself, just stay home, sleep for days on end. It was just a really, really ugly existence. It was like watching a parade go by and the parade was my life! I was just a spectator. Now I’m out there participating in my life and making those connections to people, just making a difference - I hope. I’m going to be re-enrolling in school and pursuing a degree. I’m not really sure what degree I want to go after, in what field but I’m definitely going back to school.

There’s always hope! As long as we’re alive there’s always hope for an addict. It doesn’t matter what drugs you’re using. In my case I didn’t realize it was so much the drugs. It was the depression and the suicide attempts that ultimately I needed help with. I’m proud to say I’m not taking anti-depressants right now. I did it all with the help of Crossroads Mission and God! There’s help for everyone. There’s help for addicts out there and I don’t know of anyplace else than Crossroads to find it. ♥

been a priority. We’ve found that addiction and poverty have a way of doing that. We’re very proud to be teaching skills that result in a healthy body, mind, and spirit. It’s all about health at Crossroads. ♥

Teaching the Art of Public Speaking

It involves practiced and impromptu speeches. There are leaders and moderators, as well as “fines” for rule infractions.

The group finished its session with a speech contest where three finalists delivered their speeches in front of all program participants. The first “Mission Masters” was all women but now a new group has been created for men, too. Cheers! ♥

The 3-Days of Thanksgiving and the 3-Days of Christmas have traditionally been well attended events by the homeless, the needy, and caring volunteers from the community. Last year though, we noticed a big difference - there were more people.

Even before we were done setting up we could see that people were already there waiting for everything to start. All six days we saw a steady flow of people coming and going. As soon as a table was available it was quickly occupied by others. We saw guests sitting on the curve, by the trees, and huddled together picnicking on our yard.

There were a lot families and lots of children. As a result, the crafts stations were busy and glittery areas! We had volunteer face painters on all days and it was just great to see all the little, and big,

faces sporting colorful and sparkly designs. Another popular area was the free store. There were rows of tables full of clothes, shoes, and other necessities that people got to walk through and get a whole change of clothes for them and everyone in their family.

We had produce and food items that were donated to us to give away. Many took lots of it home since we didn't want any of it to waste. There were services and supplies for all veterans thanks to our friends at the Veteran's Administration.

As in years past, Christmas Day was the most attended day of them all. The children were especially anxious to have Santa arrive so that they could get a present. Thankfully there were enough presents for all thanks to the Toys for Tots program.

Overall, all days were HUGE! But God is good and He provided abundantly - praise be! ♥

Feeding The Children

Thanks to the Feed The Children program, 900 people in Yuma received food boxes and essential items.

“Feed The Children partners with over 1,200 local agencies, including food pantries, churches, and soup kitchens, to distribute meals and necessities to more than 400,000 families nationwide.” Once again Crossroads Mission was blessed to have been chosen as the dispensing agency in Yuma County.

We printed out 900 tickets and gave them out to local churches and agencies. The tickets were

exchanged for the boxes on February 6, 2013. We created a system where people lined up in their vehicles and we loaded their boxes when their turn came up. It was very efficient and we were able to give away two truckloads of boxes in just three hours.

The people who received boxes were very happy. One even said that she felt like it was Christmas time and these were her presents!

We thank Feed The Children and all the volunteers who helped. ♥

We depend on food donations to serve an average of 10,000 meals each month. Three percent of our food is purchased and only six percent comes from the Yuma Community Food Bank.

The rest comes from big and small food donations.

This year we had it at Booth Machinery and we had a good number of friends join us. We enjoyed great food and an awesome time together. ♥





"We Need Bikes!"


